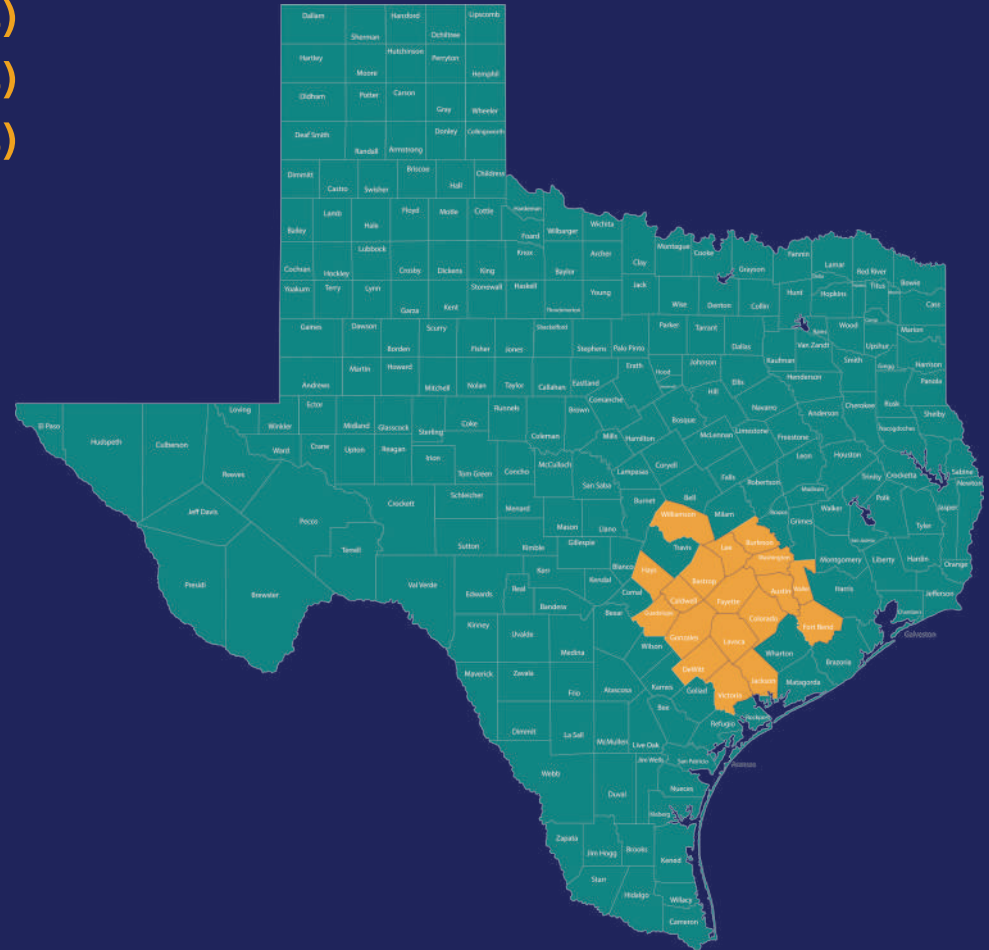

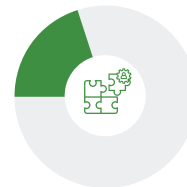

The Rural Nonprofit Networking Group (RNNG) convenes nonprofit leaders throughout the year to strengthen collaboration, build capacity, and share resources across our rural communities. In the past year, RNNG hosted six monthly meetings, three skill-building workshops, and two social gatherings creating consistent touchpoints for connection and professional growth. Topics focused on core organizational needs, including volunteer management, sustainability, and grant writing, equipping participants with practical tools to strengthen their missions and long-term impact. RNNG continues to serve as a trusted space for peer learning, shared problem-solving, and collective momentum in the nonprofit sector.





By blending professional development with opportunities for restoration, the Day of Education reinforced our commitment to supporting nonprofit leaders both in their work and in their well-being.

An extended lunch created time not only for networking but also for renewal. Participants chose from activities such as a sound bath, team-building exercises with Lutherhill Ministries, exploring the trails at Jordan Ranch, or spending time with therapy dogs.

Through its role as a trusted intermediary, GFCF continues to ensure that the community can give quickly, strategically, and generously turning compassion into action when it matters most.

Community Engagement



As a community foundation, the Greater Fayette Community Foundation (GFCF) serves as a financial hub for disaster relief, providing a trusted way for donors to support urgent community needs. By collecting contributions and directing them to organizations on the ground, GFCF ensures that donations reach the people and programs making the greatest impact, while also honoring donor intent and providing confidence that their gifts are used effectively.

In the wake of the devastating floods that struck Kerr County over the July 4th holiday, the community responded with compassion and urgency. **Through the Kerr County Flood Relief Fund at GFCF, more than \$52,000 of local donations were raised in just three weeks to support recovery efforts.**

One hundred percent of contributions were directed to the Community Foundation of the Texas Hill Country, where funds helped to meet urgent needs and supported long-term recovery. This demonstrates the important role community foundations play in reducing the burden on frontline responders and making it easier for donors to give with confidence.

While the immediate crisis may have passed, the road to recovery in Kerr County will be long. The Community Foundation of the Texas Hill Country has already distributed millions in emergency grants, and GFCF remains committed to standing alongside them and supporting their ongoing recovery.

Mobilizing Community Together



Municipalities partner with the Greater Fayette Community Foundation (GFCF) to create local funds that are guided by community members, supported by local donors, and aligned with local priorities.

Each fund is managed by GFCF, but shaped by a local advisory council made up of residents and stakeholders who help identify needs, recommend funding, and keep the work grounded in the community. The city plays a key role by identifying priorities and partnering on projects, while GFCF provides the structure to receive donations, manage funds, and distribute grants.

In Weimar, this approach is supporting the development of a sports complex to be called: **Yoder Park / Anders Fields**. The city identified

the project as a priority, and through GFCF, donors, businesses, and community members are able to contribute to and directly engage in bringing the complex to life.

In La Grange, the La Grange Arts & Culture Fund operates in a similar way. A local advisory council, made up of community members, helps guide funding decisions and identify priorities. The fund combines city investment with support from local donors to fund arts programming, cultural events, and other local creative projects that expand access to the arts.

Together, these partnerships show how community-led decision-making, local donor support, and city collaboration come together to make projects possible that might not happen otherwise.

From Property to Purpose

How Donating Real Estate Creates Lasting Community Impact

Community foundations offer donors a powerful and flexible way to give, including the ability to donate a real estate. Compared to private foundations, community foundations provide more favorable tax treatment, such as higher charitable deduction limits and no federal excise tax on investment income. Donors can contribute assets like cash, stock, or property while often receiving significant tax benefits and simplifying their charitable giving.

In 2025, the Greater Fayette Community Foundation was honored to receive a gift of real estate from Bill Bishop and Julie Ardery. By transferring the property directly to the Community Foundation, the homeowners lowered their annual capital gains tax based on the home's appraised worth. As directed by the donors, once sold, the proceeds were split between Fayette County Habitat for Humanity and GFCF.

Invested in GFCF's Community Impact Endowment, this gift is creating long-term support for the Foundation's operations and future community grants.

Whenever GFCF accepts a donation of real estate, a careful administrative process is followed to ensure the gift is handled responsibly. Accepting complex assets allows donors to align their financial and philanthropic goals while relying on the Foundation's expertise to manage the details.

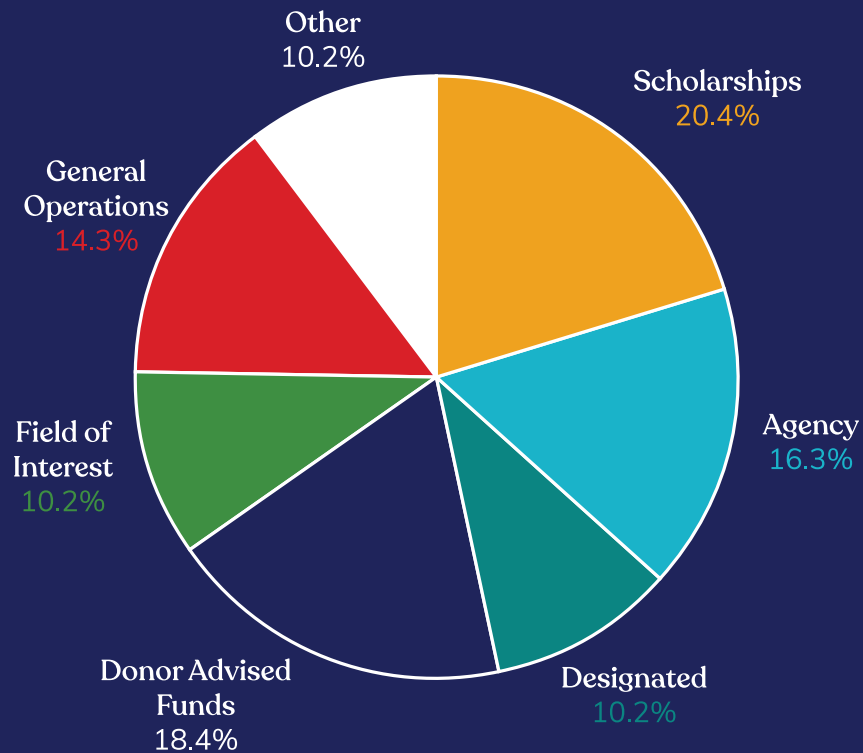

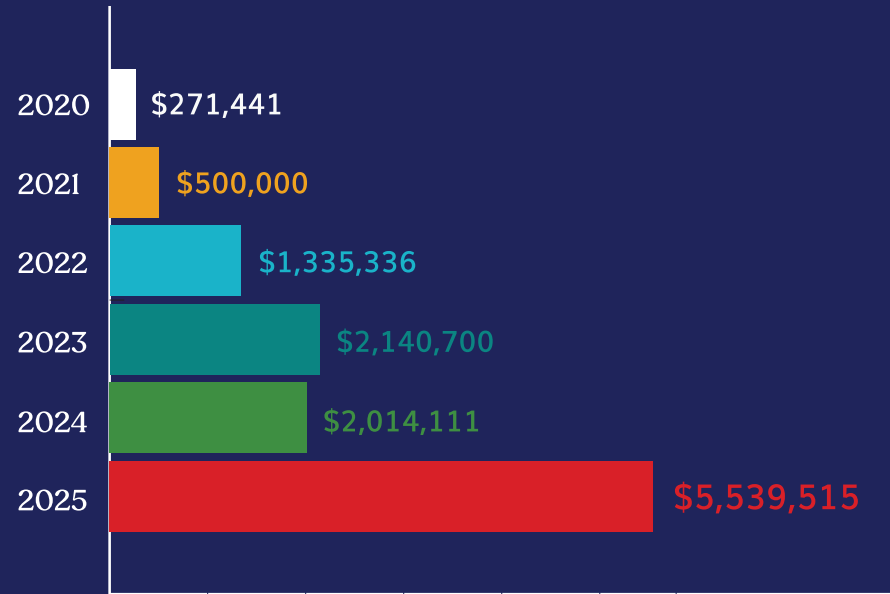
